DALLAS - The Bath House Cultural Center presents the 23<sup>rd</sup> annual *El Corazón* art exhibition from February 4 to March 4, 2017. A reception with the artists will be held on Saturday, February 4, 2017, from 7 to 9 PM, featuring live music by Chris Castañeda. The exhibition, reception, and all other events related this program are free and open to the public.

El Corazón has been a popular art event at the Bath House Cultural Center since the first year that the show's curator, Jose Vargas, decided to present what was then an invitational exhibition that included the work of a few local artists. The eclectic art pieces in the show explore multiple interpretations of the human heart (El Corazón), an important and inspiring symbol in art. Mr. Vargas has seen a constant increase in the number of artists who over the years have become interested in participating in the exhibition. This year's El Corazón exhibition includes artwork by DFW and Texas

artists, and also by artists from Washington, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Oregon, California, New York, Wisconsin, Massachusetts, Missouri, and Virginia; as well as artists from Italy, Iran, Mexico, Panama, and Ecuador.

In the process of curating the exhibition every year, Mr. Vargas understands that his own views and reflections on the theme of the exhibition are very likely to be in contradiction with some of the concepts and ideas expressed by the artists that he selects. The heart is, after all, a symbol that evokes a multiplicity of ideas and opinions. The curator once said that he had first become attracted to the symbol after seeing a picture from a board game depicting a red heart floating in mid air with an arrow shot through it. Some works of art provoke an inescapable visceral reaction and, according to Mr. Vargas, that picture of the heart had a great impact on him because it represented a passionate and raw emotion. It is true that some of the pieces of art in the El Corazón exhibition are aligned with the same elements of the heart that the curator finds so intriguing; however, many of the pieces in the show also explore other ideas that are just as moving and thought-provoking. What makes this show unique is its ability to engage the public with concepts that are wide-encompassing. Representing different emotions from primeval passion to romantic love, friendship, love of country and family, love of philosophies, ecology, politics, and other areas of human interest—the heart continues to be our most favorite symbol to tell the world how we feel and think.
